

## O'Hara Darlington

O'Hara Darlington, one of the pioneers of this community, and a great grand son of General O'Hara, who settled in the territory now occupied by the City of Pittsburgh in 1774, died at the Darlington home, Guyasuta, Tuesday following a heat prostration last Saturday.

Mr. Darlington lived all his life in the family homestead. He was liberal which was very evident when in contact with him. He was educated in the University of Pittsburgh, then known as the Western University of Pennsylvania. He later attended Yale, where he graduated with honors in 1871. Following his graduation, he traveled a year in Europe, visiting the places of historical interest and collecting historical relics.

Mr. Darlington devoted his entire life to the study of history, botany and literature. He was especially interested in the history of the nineteenth century and Allegheny county and devoted much of his time to a study of the life of Napoleon.

His love for botany caused him to devote much of his time to research and experiments. He paid strict attention to the plants collected in the private conservatory of his family and had a flower garden of his own. He had a very extensive library consisting of several thousand volumes, including some very interesting books. It was considered one of the finest in the county.

Mr. Darlington, during his early life, was a great athlete and was active in baseball, tennis, swimming and hunting. So devoted was he to baseball that prior to his death he was a regular attendant at the games at Forbes Field. He was a man of large heart, generous, and much given to charity, giving liberally to those in want.

He leaves two sisters, Mary O'Hara Darlington, and Mrs. Samuel A. Ammon, who live at Guyasuta.
