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be reprimanded." Peduto joined in the fray, noting that the Murphy administration had not been cooperative with the Citizens Police Review Board, and neither had O'Connor during his tenure on City Council and as council president.

"Bob (O'Connor) has been against the civilian review board since the beginning," said Peduto. "He voted against its creation and he voted against having officers testify. We can have officers testify before the board," he said. "It

was done in Philadelphia under Ed Rendell and it can be done here."

O'Connor questioned the legality of having officers testify in front of the review board saying, "The review board has to get more teeth, but I've talked to lawyers and I don't think we can legally force officers to testify."

But the audience at the forum really wanted to hear the candidate's views on improving minority business opportunity.

Michael Lamb stressed equality and diversity in busi-

ness opportunities for both minorities and women while commenting on his ability to cut costs with his experience in the prothonotary's office. He noted that he

O'Connor expressed that one of his greatest strengths was the ability to work with people and reiterated his plan to re-open city pools with the help of community organizations, citing how Macedonia Baptist Church took over the Ammons Recreation center.

Peduto suggested following Ed Rendell's models for the civilian review board while re-

minding all in attendance that he was the first elected city official to suggest the city should be considered for Act 47 distressed status.

The candidates also fielded a question that had to deal with the regulations that put minority and small businesses at a disadvantage when it concerns city contracts. Kendrick said as mayor he would make sure that minority business had a fair opportunity to compete with unions.

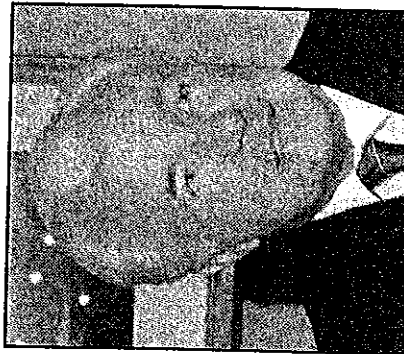
"The Lincoln-Larimer section of the city is one of the poorest neighborhoods in

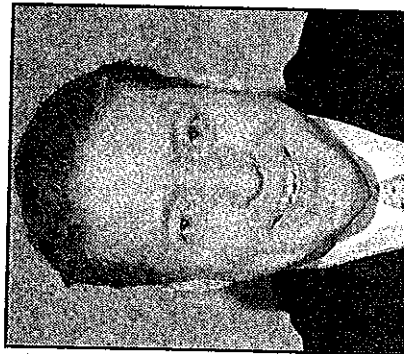

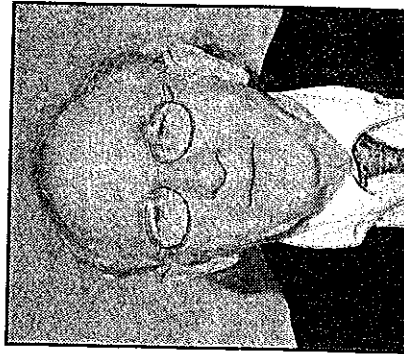
